2024 ANNUAL MEETING MINUTES

The 2024 annual meeting of the members of NorVal Electric Cooperative, Inc., was held on October22, 2024, at 5:30 P.M., at the Lustre Christian High School, in Lustre, Montana. Rocky Kittleson gave the invocation prior to dinner being served by the Lustre Women Catering.

Prior to the start of the meeting, President Chris Christensen announced that there was a record amount of children in attendance and prizes were awarded to those in attendance.

President Chris Christensen called the meeting to order at 6:30 P.M. and thanked the Lustre Women Catering for the dinner and dessert.

The President then requested that the members stand and recite the Pledge of Allegiance. The American Flag was presented by Joe Yeoman of the American Legion Post 41, and the Lustre Christian High School Choir sang the National Anthem. The President then appointed Debbie Dulaney as the recording secretary.

The list of members present at the meeting is attached to these minutes.

Secretary, Rocky Kittleson determined that a quorum was present. Mr. Kittleson read the notice of meeting and proof of mailing. President Christensen called for a motion to dispense with the reading of last year's annual meeting minutes as they were printed in their entirety in the annual meeting notice booklet. Motion was made, seconded and unanimously carried. A motion to approve the minutes as printed was called for by President Christensen. Motion was made, seconded and unanimously carried that the 2023 annual meeting minutes be approved as printed.

President Christensen introduced the former employees, former directors, and special guests in attendance, including guest speakers, Gary Wiens the MECA CEO, Remington Toavs and Kimber Dulaney, both of whom were the 2024 Youth Tour Student Delegates. President Christensen introduced the current directors to the members, being Kevin Nelson, Sam Gundermann, Rick Molvig, Rick Stahl, Ron Reddig, Rocky Kittleson and Chris Christensen.

President Christensen introduced Gretchen Boardman, the current CEO of Norval and also the General Manager of Big Flat Electric Co-op in Malta. She introduced the current employees of the cooperative and presented awards to employees and plaques to past board members for their years of service as follows:

President Christensen announced past managers of the co-op, including John Hoffman, Larry Nelson, Richard Thronson, Larry Tade, Craig Herbert and the current manager, Gretchen Boardman. He also commended Ron Reddig for his many years of service and for winning the Hard Ridin Award at the MECA annual meeting. Ron Reddig spoke on his experiences and thanked everyone.

President Christensen introduced Cory Wheeler, Certified Public Accountant, with the firm of Wheeler, Bieber & Associates, in Sidney. Mr. Wheeler was called upon to report on the financial statements. President Christensen called for a motion to approve the financial reports. A motion was made, seconded, and unanimously carried to accept the financial reports as presented. President Christensen also announced that Mr. Wheeler had been the auditor for Norval for the past 14 years and this was his last year. It was announced that Douglas Wilson and Company out of Great Falls would be the new auditor.

President Christensen introduced guest speaker, Gary Wiens, who is the current CEO of MECA. Mr. Wiens thanked Ron Reddig for all of his years of service, and also commended all of the veterans in attendance and reported on various issues the MECA board is working on.

President Christensen then called upon Remington Toavs and Kimber Dulaney to report on their Youth trip to Washington, DC. Both talked about their experiences and Kimber presented a slide show.

President Christensen and CEO Gretchen Boardman then presented a question and answer session between the two of them as their report to the members. President Christensen noted that Gretchen is the only female CEO in the U.S. operating two cooperatives. They then opened the floor for questions.

President Christensen introduced Katie Knierim, attorney for Norval to introduce the candidates running for the director positions and to run the election portion of the meeting. Attorney Knierim announced the candidates for each open director position, being Rick Stahl, the incumbent running unopposed in District 5, and Brian Miller, running unopposed in District 6. Ms. Knierim stated since this was not a contested election that we would dispense with formal ballots and elect the candidates by acclamation. Ms. Knierim asked for all present to signify the approval of both candidates, and the following directors were elected by acclamation:



- 2. I once thought all our power came locally from Fort Peck and only served our co-op. Learning that it is part of a statewide operation was surprising.




- 1. My favorite part has been representing the members of our local cooperative and it has truly been an honor.


