

Annual meeting is also a time for members to vote on the co-op's board of directors.

Our board of directors is comprised of 7 members who live and work right here in our local service area, so they are in the best position to know where community investments are most needed. And by the way, we hope you'll consider running for the board in the future – we're always looking for folks who care about our community who would be willing to serve. This year we will be electing a board member for Districts 2, 4, and 7.

#### Your electric bill is an investment in our community.

This local input means those closest to the community know its needs and priorities and help direct where co-ops dollars are spent. Every year, we invest funds to make updates to our local system, which helps maintain reliability and grid resilience. Think of it this way: every time you pay your electric bill, you're actually investing in your community because all the money we take in stays here in the local community. ### **First Responder Training**

On March 21, NorVal Electric and NorthWestern Energy teamed up to bring our local first responders a training on what to do when they come across a scene involving electricity. They went over how to get someone out of a vehicle that has a downed line on it, what to do when there is water involved, and what to do during a structure fire. NorVal Electric linemen, Cody and Jayson, put on a presentation

using our "hot trailer." They demonstrated what enter and exit wounds might look like using a watermelon and oranges, the difference between car tires and the tires on a bicycle. We had a great turn out with participants from Glasgow/Long Run, Hinsdale, St. Marie, Nashua, and Fort Peck FD; Valley County Search and Rescue, Glasgow FMDH EMS, and Montana Highway Patrol.





Thermostat placement can impact your HVAC system's ability to maintain an ideal indoor temperature. Thermostats should be placed in the center of the home, away from air vents, plumbing pipes and exterior doors. Avoid placing items like lamps near your thermostat, which can cause the HVAC to run longer than necessary. Avoid installing thermostats in rooms that feel warmer or colder than the rest of the home.

Kyle Barras and Tracy Henry demonstrated what to do if the students come

across a downed line and why they should never touch a line. They cut open an orange to explain what could happen to our bodies if they do come in contact with electricity. As you can see from the bottom right-hand photo, many of the students really enjoyed watching the arcs and fire from the fruit and hotdogs.

We sent the students in Kindergarten through third grade home with a coloring book filled with safety tips and more information on where power comes from and the different types of power lines. The fourth and fifth graders received a book called *Wish Upon a Crawdad*. This book follows the story of a 12 year old girl and her family as they start an electric co-op in their community.

We would like to say one more *huge* thank you to Ed Sugg for making this happen and to all the students and teachers that came to watch and listen to who we are and what we do every day.
