

ith the bitter cold this winter, heating bills are on the rise. The following programs are here to help your family through the winter months!

### LIEAP (Low Income Energy Assistance Program)

Action for Eastern Montana covers the 17 Eastern Counties of Montana. If you live in Carter. Custer. Daniels. Dawson. Garfield. Fallon. McCone, Phillips, Powder River, Prairie, Richland, Roo-

sevelt, Rosebud, Sheridan, Treasure, Valley or Wibaux Counties, please apply for our program to see if you qualify for assistance.

The LIEAP program is designed to help Low-Income families and individuals with a portion of their heating bills from October - April; it doesn't matter if you rent or own your bills. Often, families who live from paycheck to paycheck face home. LIEAP eligibility is based on your household income (all money brought in) and resources (any assets you have in the bank, property or real estate, CD's, Stocks and Bonds, etc.).

One question often asked by a potential client is: "If I get might need it more than me?" The answer: NO. If you qualify for the program based on your income and resources, the state of Montana has put aside some assistance for you. If you bypass this assistance, you're only hurting yourself or your family. It's your tax dollars at work. LIEAP is here to help you achieve selfreliance and self-sufficiency.

Once you are approved for LIEAP, a one-time payment will be sent to your utility. This benefit amount will be posted to your account and will be used for charges during the winter months. Any unused benefits will be returned to the state of MT at the end of the heating season.

All households must reapply each year, if assistance is still needed. If you are Native American, living on an Indian Reservation, you must apply for Tribal LIHEAP.

All records and information about your situation are kept confidential. The LIEAP benefit amount is figured according to the number of household members, bedrooms, type of home, primary heat source and the total household income for 12 months.

### **Energy Share of Montana**

Energy Share of Montana is a private nonprofit organization. The primary purpose is to help Montanans faced with energy emergencies meet their needs and move toward selfreliance. They raise money through private donations and coordinate the efforts of energy providers and human services agencies to distribute resources to those most in need. Energy Share offers funds to any family with any energy emergency. Recipients are encouraged to repay these funds if and when they are financially able to do so.

One of the main ways they help people is with their heating some type of financial emergency when an unexpected expense occurs. This could be something like a vehicle break down, lay off from work, or medical expense/emergency.

Energy Share is the only assistance available to Montana fam-LIEAP, will it take assistance away from someone else that ilies who have income too high to qualify for LIEAP assistance. Applicants must first apply for LIEAP before they can apply for Energy Share. If applicants are ineligible for LIEAP or are still in need of assistance once receiving LIEAP, they can apply for Energy Share.

- 1 tablespoon oil
  - 1 onion minaad
  - 1 onion minced
  - 3 large carrots peeled and diced
  - 1 stalk celery diced
  - 1 teaspoon minced garlic
- 1 teaspoon dried parsley
- 1/2 teaspoon dried thyme
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/8 teaspoon black pepper
- 5 cups low sodium chicken broth
- 2 chicken breasts
- 1 cup brown rice
- 1 cup evaporated milk <u>Directions</u>

In a large soup pot, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add onion, carrots and celery. Cook and stir for 3-4 minutes until onion begins to turn golden. Add garlic, parsley and thyme and cook for 1 minute. Add salt, pepper, broth and chicken. Then add rice and stir. Bring to a boil over mediumhigh heat. Reduce heat to medium-low (a simmer). Cover and cook for 30 minutes stirring every 10 minutes until vegetables and rice are tender. Remove chicken from pot and shred. Add back to the pot with evaporated milk and serve.
